



A SALUTE TO VIVIAN CUSHING



We in the Society reflect on the outstanding historical work done by the late Vivian Cushing, who passed away since the previous Grist issue at the age of nearly 98. Vivian served the Society in a number of ways. She was its Treasurer for many years, carefully keeping our books in excellent shape. She also was the co-author, with Jim Gould, of the Arcadia book on the History of Marstons Mills—a book which has been a valuable tool of reference for many members in reconstructing the past of the Mills. Vivian and Jim both generously donated all of their royalty payments to the Society's treasury. Still another major contribution was her voluminous writings—in many cases handwritten—about the genealogical history of numerous Mills families. These records now reside safely in our Archives at the Library. In her writing she also recorded many events from recollections of past citizens of the Village. Our Archives are significantly richer as a result of all of her writings. Her family is currently identifying other local historical records and writings that she kept, for additional donation to the Archives. We treasure her memory and her many historical accomplishments.

A BRITISH PERSPECTIVE OF CAPE COD

An international perspective on Cape Cod History was the subject of the September 2023 meeting. Mr. Michael Kemp, amateur historian from County Devon in England, presented fascinating evidence of the historical parallels between Barnstable, Massachusetts and Barnstaple, England (for which Barnstable was named in the 17th century). Using maps and other documents, Michael demonstrated how some of the Barnstaple names became Barnstable names, as well as common products such as the brick industry in both places which used similar clay deposits and therefore have some common designs. And the parallels are even somewhat geographical—Barnstable has its Sandy Neck as a peninsula and Barnstaple has its Braunton Burrows; both are sandy and both were used as training grounds for World War Two American troops who were preparing for the assault on the Normandy beaches of France in June of 1944. Michael presented a lovely illustrated gift book to the Society—the history of Barnstaple, England

FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY

For its observance of its 40th anniversary at the October meeting, the Society enjoyed a four-part celebration which took place at the Burgess House (which was also celebrating its own 200th anniversary). First was a composite color slide show developed by former president Sandy Bolton on events and individuals since the 30th anniversary in 2013. Next was an original play, written by Sandy, called "Something Old, Something New"; the event was a play-reading about local events including the use of a metal detector (see later article on this topic); actors included Sue Crocker, Rick Presbrey, and David Martin. This event was followed by a performance by a Barbershop Quartet—The Sand Bars—from the local Barbershop Chorus, The Surftones; in the quartet was Sue Martin, wife of President David Martin. The events concluded with a giant birthday cake citing both the Society and Burgess House.

METAL DETECTION CONTINUES



Member Tony Mulone continues in his third year of effective use of a fine model of metal detector around historic local sites. Among his recent uncoverings have been further detecting at the William Marston house on Route 149 and the site of the now-removed elementary school. Among his discoveries, all of which have been shared with Society members, have been metal tools, discarded bottles, a musket ball, and a number of old coins. Some careful guesswork is now being applied to a mysterious old coin. Anyone with an historic property is invited to contact Tony to set up a session when Tony will bring his special instrument; all discoveries are shown to the property owner and the owner can decide whether or not to keep them or donate them to the Society. SPECIAL FUNDRAISER EVENT

On October 28, a special fund-raiser event was held at Liberty Hall, to benefit the community and the Society. A guitar musician began the afternoon program, followed by a repeat performance by the same players of the play, "Something Old, Something New". A stand-up comedian then entertained the audience with his humor, some of which had local references. A raffle for a gourmet gift basket was held, along with a separate raffle for one free hour of genealogical consultation. Refreshments were provided, along with a chance to purchase Society-related books, T-shirts, and sweatshirts. The event was supported by a special grant from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, initiated by Sandy Bolton. More than \$400 was raised to benefit the Society.



ARCHIVES CONTINUE TO EXPAND

The Society's Archives, in the lower level of the Library, continues to expand as space allows. HYDRANGEA FESTIVAL 2024

The Society will participate in July 2024 in the annual Hydrangea Festival of Barnstable. SANDWICH & MARSTONS MILLS PROGRAM

For its November meeting, historian John Cullity of Sandwich provided a presentation on historic events which are shared by adjacent Sandwich and Marstons Mills. He provided historic photographs of people and events in the Mills, including information about some historic Mills families. John had previously provided significant displays for the 2022 Nye House Museum's program about Cape Cod and the Revolution. He specifically set the stage for the December program which is described next.

THE CROCKERS OF MARSTONS MILLS

The December 2023 meeting featured a presentation by member Jeffrey Crocker, who lives in Virginia but spends some time each year visiting his parents in the local area. Jeffrey has done extensive research on the numerous Crocker families who populated the region; he gave a Talk in August on the Crockers of Cotuit. His presentation for the Society naturally focused on the branches of the family who lived – and continue to live—in Marstons Mills. One focus was on the historical character, Samuel Fremont Crocker—an inventor, entrepreneur, and long-time resident in the past. Jeffrey has published a book on the Crocker family and will prepare a second edition which will include some newer discoveries.

HISTORY OF REVOLUTION ON CAPE COD & ISLANDS

David Martin is currently coordinating the production of a new book on the Revolutionary War on the Cape and Islands, for the Cape and Islands Historical Association. The book will appear before the 250th anniversary of the Revolution in 2026.
